

It was a different Easter from anything we had known before and, in some ways, it still is! We have had Zoom gatherings online (especially for Lent) but this Easter we are BACK in church.





Stations of the Cross for Holy Week 2021



News from the MU website:

The last year has been a year like no other – and tough almost beyond endurance for many, writes MU CEO Bev Jullien

Our National Day of Reflection on 23rd March was part of coming to terms, as a nation, with the way our life has been turned upside down due to COVID-19 – and to start to reflect on how we can learn from this to truly "build back better", and address some of the deep divides in our society, which the pandemic has made so starkly visible.

Mothers' Union members have helped throughout – often, the seemingly small things that really add up, such as making scrubs and scrub bags for hospital workers; making pairs of knitted hearts for those alone on coronavirus wards and their loved ones, so that they feel less alone; phone calls to the isolated; a Book of Comfort and doorstep gifts for people who needed them.

Worldwide, MU members helped with practical support, spreading messages about the need for social distancing, teaching hand hygiene and countering fake news about COVID-19. To keep in touch, even those wary and inexperienced in using technology embraced Zoom and Facetime with aplomb, helping to support one another and stay connected around the world.

Now, as in Britain and Ireland, we begin to see light and hope for a new beginning, we are at a crossroads, and have the opportunity to reflect – to acknowledge the grief of those who have lost loved ones through COVID or others causes, and to walk alongside them – as well as to recognize those who have suffered most, financially or spiritually, and to reflect on how we, called by our faith and together with others, can work to address inequality, and truly "build back better" for all.

COVID has shown that, as a nation, we are deeply divided into haves and have nots, and the latter have suffered deeply, too many reduced to queuing round the block to access foodbanks. Some groups have been disproportionately affected, the elderly, the poor and BAME communities, and gender-based violence has escalated and been brought into sharp focus by the death of Sarah Everard. As members of Mothers' Union, let us prayerfully reflect on what we can continue to do, or start to do differently, to create a "new normal" – sustaining the new togetherness across boundaries, and speaking out and taking action to end violence, poverty and injustice.

The Wondrous Cross

I have been particularly struck this Lent by the powerful, challenging words of the well-known hymn 'When I Survey the Wondrous Cross.'

Since moving to train for ministry, I have been living within the shadow of Durham Cathedral. The bells ring out every day, calling me to this holy site of prayer and pilgrimage over centuries. I am thankful to be able to walk into the vast space and add my prayers to the countless prayers that have been offered here. I often sit on a pew where my view enables me to see the silver cross on the high altar behind the St



Cuthbert's cross which appears to be nestling in the centre of the Rose Window. In our own St Peter's Church, wherever you sit, the cross is visible, a symbol, an icon of resurrection, of Christ defeating death.

I don't know about you, but this is what I think of most when I think of the cross... resurrection not crucifixion. But in Lent, the altar cloth in the cathedral has been changed.


Now, a large crown of thorns forms the centrepiece so my attention has been drawn to the manner of Jesus' death more than his resurrection. I have been reflecting more on those lines...'the wondrous cross, on which the Prince of Glory died.'

Jesus, who we proclaim as Saviour, who we know by faith, will hang on a cross, with a crown of thorns pressing into his head. He will suffer and will die an agonising, humiliating death. The crowds who witnessed the raising of Lazarus, who shouted Hosanna! will soon be the ones who shout Crucify.

Whether we are life-long followers or newer to faith, I wonder whether this may be something that we continue to reflect on year after year. I haven't any answers but I have been pondering on 2 thoughts.

Firstly, Jesus is for ALL people. His sacrifice enables us today to witness to the power of him in our lives, and to invite others to come and see for themselves. By his death, resurrection and glorious ascension, the message of the cross, the richest gain of knowing Jesus as Lord is revealed.

Secondly, Jesus is lifted up. Literally, as the cross is raised, he will be hoisted up as a signal, lifted up as signpost, a perfect icon of God's love for the world. But he is not only lifted up on the wooden cross, he is lifted up in exultation. Through his surrender, comes triumph over death. Through the agony and shame of the cross, we see his glory. This is wondrous, this is how he is glorified.



We cannot fully grasp what God has done. We may weep still in the presence of death and

struggle against the forces of darkness in our lives and in the world today but we can trust that as Christ was lifted up on a wooden cross, so too, by the life-giving power of God's spirit, he came through death and out the other side into resurrection life. To believe that only through Christ's blood shed on the cross can we discover the meaning of life in all its fullness, is foolishness to many but all who come and see this Jesus, find that when we are at our most burdened, we can turn to the one who bears our burdens for us. When we are broken, God makes us whole.

As we journey through Holy Week to Easter, whether in our houses or in the church building, in prayer and in praise, let us survey this wondrous cross on which the Prince of Glory died, let us count our richest gains as loss, and let us pour contempt on all our pride, for, as the hymn ends, 'Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.'

NEWS FROM THE FRIENDS OF REDCAR CEMETERY

On Mothering Sunday we usually have a stall, giving visitors a flower remembrance made by the Craft Group for their mother's grave side, but because of the Covid

restrictions we were not able to do that.

This year we had a kind offer from the Ladies of Steel to come to the cemetery with bunches of daffodils to lay at the children's graves in the Precious Garden. Meeting them was a small group of our Friends, including Wendy and Theresa who look after the children's graves every week, and Mary, who is looking after the baby memorial in the old section. The Ladies had made a spring wreath including a teddy to lay here.



The baby memorial was established in 2007 where 150 babies are buried in unmarked graves from 1930-70. We chose the stone from a local quarry; with the help of the council who transported it and positioned it has made a place where people who have lost a little one can pay their respects.

It is a pleasure to work in the cemetery now that spring is on the way. We have many spring flowers and bulbs flowering thanks to the gardening members planting thousands of them in the past.

This image shows the bird bath gifted to us by Rev. Nicky Penn-Allison when she was a curate at St Peters. The bird bath was left to her by her Aunt and because she was always moving about in different parts of the country, she felt it would be

safer with us. It is surrounded by daffodils and is in a corner of the old section of the cemetery. Thanks to Nicky who liked to help with fundraising and served on our market stalls.




