



The Vicar Writes...

Lent and Easter are over now for another year... well that's not exactly true because the church's season of Easter lasts until 18th May, the eve of Pentecost. I'm writing this during Holy Week, a very special time when we concentrate on the price Jesus paid for our salvation and when we look forward to the wonder and marvel of Easter. Christ is Risen!! St Paul tells the Corinthian church, '.... *if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith'.*



There are many things that we could take from Lent and Easter that bring us nearer to Christ. What did you take and how might that change you? One of the moments that always impresses and challenges me are the words of Jesus on the cross. Especially "Father, forgive them! They do not know what they are doing".

Forgiveness is a key element of our faith. God forgives us and we should forgive others.

Here's a couple of stories about forgiveness:

There's a Spanish story of a father and son who had become estranged. The son ran away, and the father set off to find him. He searched for months to no avail. Finally, in a last desperate effort to find him, the father put an ad in a Madrid newspaper. The ad read: Dear Paco, meet me in front of this newspaper office at noon on Saturday. All is forgiven. I love you. Your Father. On Saturday 800 Pacos showed up, looking for forgiveness and love from their fathers.

When Narvaez, the Spanish patriot, lay dying, his father-confessor asked him whether he had forgiven all his enemies. Narvaez looked astonished and said, "Father, I have no enemies, I have shot them all."

Whatever you took from Lent and Easter I hope and pray that your walk with God is nearer and more blessed than before.







Reader's Rambling

Lent- Reflection and Renewal

Hi everyone

Since we started Reflections on Wednesday evenings, we have had a lot of interesting discussions. We have been lucky to welcome new people in to church, many asking about faith, what it means, do they have any faith and how to explore more deeply what "having faith" in their lives can mean. Someone new to the group, wanting to examine their faith more, said that they did not understand what our church service was all about, the various elements and in some cases what seemed to be needless chanting, where we all repeat the same words together.

On unpacking this question more closely the chanting part was discovered to be the creed. We decided as a group to look at the various parts and break them down into manageable chunks for better understanding. We agreed that the creed was a good place to start and it got me thinking, I wonder how many more people feel the same way, and are put off because they don't understand or just repeat the words without feeling them and getting the meaning, so I thought I would give you a precis of what our creed means and what it stands for.

Way back at the earliest beginnings of the church there was a lot of dispute over various aspects of Jesus's teachings and overall questions of faith. In the fourth century two leading theologists known as the church father's Arius and Athanasius disagreed on the relationship between God and Jesus. There are whole chapters available going into the exact disagreements but for this piece we will accept there were major differences. The Roman emperor at the time Constantine was the first Christian Roman Emperor and he called together the ecumenical Bishops of the time to try and get a common ground and a settling of the religious unease within his empire.

In AD325 the leaders gathered at a place called Nicaea and having discussed and referred to early documents, a common statement was formed, The Nicaean Creed as we know it and apart from some slight word modernisation, it remains the same statement that we say in our eucharistic worship every Sunday. Wikipedia describes the Creed as a universally accepted statement of the main points of the Christian faith that is represented in a concise, formal way.

Why this was needed? Well, the early church tended to use Lent as a time for preparing new Christians for baptism. This would traditionally take place on Easter day and an important part of this preparation was that those being baptised on Easter day was that they should publicly state their newly accepted faith in God. The Creed comprises twelve statements that generally cover what we need to say when declaring our faith in God.

I have condensed this greatly, but hopefully highlighted the history and why we say it as we do, so when we are at our next Eucharistic service and we all stand to say the Creed, we can recite those words with a little more feeling, knowing why we say them.



Hi Again!

With Easter upon us and we are all thinking about how we will celebrate, this reminder of the Passion came up on my facebook page and I thought I would share it with you.



"He received 39 stripes because 40 was known to kill a man. They wanted him alive. They held handfuls of his beard, and hair and pulled it out by the roots. They wanted him alive. They kicked, punched, and spit on him for hours. Until there wasn't a single spot on his body not covered in blood. They wanted him alive.

They shoved a crown of thorns down on his head so

harshly it stuck in his skin. They wanted him alive. After hours of being beaten, mocked, whipped, flogged, and tortured they made him walk with a cross. They made him carry it. A rough piece of wood with splinters digging into fresh wounds. They wanted him alive.

They wanted him to feel every ounce of pain they could bring. He had to feel it in order to heal us. Crucifixion was historically one of the cruellest most tortured deaths a human could face. Hours upon hours of torture. Torture most of us can not mentally think of because the cruelty isn't normal. It isn't something our minds can comprehend. We celebrate Easter with pastel colours, happy children hunting eggs, and chocolate. The truth is, there was absolutely nothing happy about the day Jesus died. It was cruel, bloody, and nasty.

He could have stopped all of it. He could have called every angel in heaven to demolish every person standing and shouting "Crucify Him!" He didn't. He knew in order to have a Sunday you have to have a Friday. He knew in order to have joy you have to carry your cross. He felt everything that day. He felt how your heart broke wide open when you had to watch your baby die. He felt how heavy your life was when you were staring down the barrel of a gun wondering if the man you called husband was going to shoot you. He carried the weight of the burden you have felt since your spouse died and life just doesn't seem right since.

On that cross he held the rapist and murderers, the sinner and the saint. He levelled every playing field and said ALL of you are worth it. He knew he had to carry the cross. He never promised the cross you carry in this life would not be heavy. His wasn't. His promise is that Sunday is coming.

No matter how heavy Friday is. Financially, emotionally, mentally, or physically. Friday is heavy. That cross is weighing you down and you are about to crumble under its weight. His promise was simply this. He won't make you carry it alone. What kind of king would step down from his throne for this?

Jesus of Nazareth, the Son of God did. For you. He did every bit of it for you and me. Oh yes, it is heavy. So heavy sometimes you do not think you can take one more step. But look up, because Sunday is coming."

I do not know who wrote this, but it is POWERFUL!
