




Wales is a beautiful country and Debbie and I were blessed to visit there in June to take in the sights. I've been a few times but had never been to Portmerion on the NW coast.

Portmerion is a very strange place, built on the side of a hill, leading down to a river estuary that eventually finds its way into Cardigan Bay. The town is basically a large folly with a mismatch mix of architectural styles. It looks more like a small Italian town rather than somewhere you'd find in Wales. You may even recognise it even if you haven't ever been, because it is where they filmed the 1960s TV drama 'The Prisoner' starring Patrick McGoohan.



This was a strange programme, that I have never really understood except that the main character wakes up to find himself trapped there. His identity is taken away



and he is left being known simply as number 6. It's an interesting concept that he is a prisoner but not in a regular sort of prison with locks and bars but in a rather weird but pleasant village. No prison guards, just large white balloons that chase any escapee across the beach.

Many of us are imprisoned, not perhaps by authorities but by circumstances, addictions, relationships, behaviours, disabilities, health issues, poverty, debts It is an awful feeling being a prisoner of something. Jesus walked into a synagogue near the start of his ministry and read aloud a passage from Isaiah, he read, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." (Luke 4)

Here was Jesus' manifesto, *his declaration of intent, the statement of his goals of who he is and what he is all about. This is his big idea, his mission statement, his Jesus plan.

The words he actually uses, however, are not his own creation: they are the five-hundred-year-old words of Isaiah 61: 1–2. He makes them his own, however, by saying, 'at last now is the time, I am the one, the Spirit is on me, I am anointed and this is what I am going to do'. When we read his 'what I am going to do list' we can see it falling into two major zones of thought, almost as if his plan has got two major thrusts. One is all about addressing people's immediate and physical needs, whilst the second idea responds to their eternal spiritual needs.

Jesus is going to reach out to the poor, release the captives, give sight to the blind and free the oppressed. At the same time he will bring good news and proclamation. He is going to touch their bodies and reach into their souls, give them help and hope. Having read out Isaiah's amazing prophetic and promise words he calmly sits down, everyone's eyes are on him and he says, 'today this scripture is fulfilled'. Wow, we have lift off. Jesus makes the words of Isaiah his two pronged or twin zoned mission statement. Today if we are serious about following him it should be ours too.

The problem is we find it very difficult to follow two tracks at the same time. There have clearly been times in the churches history where it has been all proclamation and very little helping of the poor. In today's church we seem to have got it the other way round, lots of helping the poor, getting involved in social community issues and raising grants but not much proclamation of the Good News. Jesus did both and made them part of the one whole mission. Here then is a big question for us all. Looking at our own individual mission and that of our church have we got a well-balanced 'holistic' mission in the way Jesus had?



Spiritual Disciplines: Solitude

'Solitude is a time when we withdraw from the company of others in order to give God our undivided attention' (John Ortberg).

The spiritual discipline of solitude is about spending time alone with God, to grow in relationship with Him and hear Him more clearly. This practice was a priority in Jesus' life and ministry, especially at crucial moments eg 'Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed' (Mark 1:35).

Solitude is not so much about what we do as what we don't do! If we want to hear God, we need to consciously shut out the external noise in our lives and focus on the quiet inside us. If we are honest, this can be a real struggle. We want to do it, but other things can so easily get in the way: distractions, tiredness, jobs that need doing, wandering thoughts etc. Solitude gives us an opportunity to enjoy God's presence, as somebody who we really want to spend time with.

Richard Foster ('Celebration of Discipline') suggests some ways in which we might grow in this discipline:

- 'Little solitudes': small everyday moments to seek inner silence eg, coffee times, travelling to work and time spent outside.
- Quiet place: having specific places where we go to be quiet, eg a room or special chair in our home.
- **Retreat:** organising a retreat where we can have time in silence and solitude. We need to plan carefully how we use our time with God, including silent listening, meditating on Scripture, prayer, journaling, taking a meditative walk, or listening to a worship CD.

'If we possess inward solitude we do not fear being alone, for we know that we are not alone.' (Richard Foster)

Mary Magdalene

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered this month in the church's calendar.

What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past:

When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Put Jesus at the centre of our world:

Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest in the world:

Mary is a great example of Paul's words: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.' (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as secondclass citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously.

We should be careful not to dismiss the things that don't follow our expectations, because Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we let Him, He can do it through us!




